Social Impact Assessment Report (2023–24)- Executive Summary CSR projects of Manappuram Finance Ltd

Introduction

As an extension of its previous CSR initiatives, Manappuram Finance Ltd (MAFIL), through Manappuram Foundation—has taken various steps toward this vision during 2023–24. MAFIL has supported the development of community infrastructure in rural Thrissur. This was done via activities like scaling up the infrastructure in their polyclinics, counselling centerss, skill development centerss and educational institutions, while also supporting the creation of spaces that promote physical and mental well-being. The overarching goal of these initiatives was to build holistic, self-reliant rural communities.

About the SIA

SAN India was commissioned by MAFIL to conduct a Social Impact Assessment of MAFIL's CSR initiatives in 2023-24. This report provides a comprehensive overview of the reach, relevance, and effectiveness of the various initiatives undertaken in rural regions like Thrissur, Valappad, and Irinjalakuda. It documents how the initiatives have influenced the quality of life, health outcomes, educational access, and overall well-being of the local population.

About MAFIL's CSR projects

In 2023-24, MAFIL funded over 40 CSR projects (individual and units) within the following thematic areas.




Figure 1 Focus area of MAFIL'S 2023-24 CSR Initiatives

About the SIA

MAFIL engaged SAN India in April 2025 to conduct a social impact assessment (SIA) of the CSR initiatives. The study was led by Ms. Neeta N. K., Social Auditor at SAN India, under the expert guidance of Ms. Latha Suresh, Director of SAN India. The assessment aimed to evaluate the implementation process, measure achievements, and assess the relevance of the projects supported during FY 2023-24.

Scope: The scope of the assessment covers the period from 1, April 2023 to 31, March 2024 and also includes the pending CSR financial support from 2022–23, which was allocated for the expansion of Ma Geet School and the Manappuram Premium Gym.

Methodology: As part of the assessment process, field visits were conducted to Thrissur, Valappad, Irinjalakuda. The methodology included collecting feedback from stakeholders through structured consultations. An initial telephonic meeting with a representative from MAFIL was conducted to finalize the consultation plan and establish timelines. The study used a combination of quantitative and qualitative methodologies. A desk review of documentation provided by MAFIL and Manappuram Foundation was done. This review established a baseline understanding of the project's intended objectives and its execution. 662 stakeholders were reached out to during the impact assessment.

Overview

- **Total reach:** In total, the CSR projects supported by MAFIL reached 1,46,492 number of beneficiaries across various sectors.
- Among these, healthcare initiatives had the widest reach, impacting over **1,40,299** individuals.
- Education-focused projects directly supported **2393** students, providing access to improved learning environments, resources, and academic support.
- Rural development interventions reached an estimated **3,800** individuals, though exact figures were not available at the time of reporting.

Total financial support provided:

- In the financial year 2023–24, MAFIL provided a total of Rs. **43.48 crore** towards its CSR initiatives.
- The largest allocation was made toward healthcare initiatives (Rs. 22.67 crore)
- The education projects received Rs. **19.6** crore.
- In the area of rural development, **Rs. 1.21** crore was spent.
- An additional CSR budget allocation of Rs. 5.71 crore was made to address pending commitments from the 2022–23 financial year, comprising:
- Rs 1.31 crore for the expansion of Ma Geet School.
- Rs 4.40 crore for the enhancement of Manappuram Premium Gym.

This allocation reflects MAFIL's strategic approach to upgrading infrastructure within rural areas both for immediate community needs and long-term development goals.

Health

Background

Since the inception of its CSR programs, Manappuram Finance India Ltd (MAFIL) has prioritized improving healthcare access in rural Kerala, particularly in underserved regions like Thrissur and Valappad. Recognizing the critical need for quality medical services, MAFIL has focused on developing healthcare infrastructure, promoting preventive care, and facilitating access to advanced medical technologies. Its initiatives include the establishment of polyclinics, wellness gyms, yoga centers, swimming pool and counselling centers. By working on building infrastructure for health, collaborating with reputed healthcare organizations, and supporting training programs for local health workers, MAFIL aims to bridge the urban-rural healthcare divide and bring world-class medical services to rural Thrissur.

In 2023–24, MAFIL expanded its CSR efforts to strengthen healthcare infrastructure across multiple initiatives in Thrissur. These included upgrading two Polyclinics in Kochi and Thrissur with modern diagnostic equipment, supporting equipment to reach a premium gym, a swimming pool, a yoga center and a counseling center. MAFIL supported training programs for local healthcare workers and partnered with organizations to provide specialized care in Valappad and surrounding areas. These initiatives aim to enhance healthcare accessibility, reduce disparities between urban and rural regions, and empower Thrissur's rural population with sustainable, high-quality medical services.

Financial support and overall reach

A total CSR investment of Rs. **22,67,91,263** was given by MAFIL during the year 2023–24. In all 1,40,299 patients were reached via these efforts.

MaCare Polyclinics

Introduction

MaCare Polyclinics, established under the Manappuram Foundation's CSR framework in Thrissur and Kochi, aim to bridge healthcare disparities in rural and urban Kerala. The Thrissur center serves rural communities with advanced diagnostics and a geriatric mobile unit, while the Kaloor center in Kochi focuses on super-specialty dental care and accessible diagnostics. Equipped with cutting-edge technology, these centers align with Manappuram's mission of "Precious Life, Priceless Care," delivering affordable, high-quality healthcare to underserved populations.

Support provided

The Manappuram Foundation (MAFIL) has been pivotal in supporting MaCare Diagnostics Centers, allocating Rs. 15.07 crores in 2023-24. This includes Rs. 10.03 crores in capital expenditure for advanced equipment like 128-slice CT scanners, 1.5 Tesla Siemens MRI machines, dental lasers, and CBCT, alongside facility upgrades such as dental bed expansion in Kaloor. Additionally, Rs. 5.03 crores in operational expenditure covered staff salaries, training, equipment maintenance, and subsidized services, ensuring affordability and operational efficiency for underserved communities.

Highlights

MaCare Polyclinics have reached 1,29,558 patients, with Thrissur serving 68,669 rural patients and Kaloor catering to 60,889 urban patients. Thrissur's advanced diagnostics, including a 128-slice CT scanner and 1.5 Tesla MRI, conducted 68,449 tests, while Kaloor's dental expansion supported 2,844 procedures. Subsidized services, such as 70% of tests in Thrissur and 60% of dental services in Kaloor, alongside a geriatric mobile unit and health workshops, have enhanced accessibility and community trust.

Overall performance

MaCare Polyclinics have demonstrated exceptional performance, with 96% of beneficiaries rating services as affordable, 94% praising quality, and 92% appreciating timely diagnostics. The centers achieved a 40% reduction in urban referrals in Thrissur, a 25% decrease in gum disease prevalence, and a 20% reduction in mortality rates through early NCD detection. Efficient operations, with diagnostic tests completed in one day compared to up to seven days at public facilities, highlight MaCare's impact on healthcare delivery.

Overall Impact

- Improved Health Outcomes: Advanced diagnostics like 128-slice CT and 1.5 Tesla MRI enabled 2,836 precise diagnoses, reducing NCD mortality by 20% in Thrissur and complications by 15% in Kaloor.
- **Reduced Disparities**: Subsidized services for 10,000 low-income patients in Thrissur and 8,000 in Kaloor, alongside rural mobile units, bridged urban-rural healthcare gaps.
- **Enhanced Accessibility**: Thrissur's 24/7 clinic and Kaloor's metro connectivity served 150,000 and 200,000 residents, respectively, with 60% and 55% being first-time patients.
- **Community Trust**: 50 health workshops in Thrissur and 30 in Kaloor reached 8,000 residents, boosting health literacy and trust.

• **Cost Reduction**: Affordable diagnostics (e.g., CT scans at Rs. 3,000, dental implants at Rs. 20,000) lowered out-of-pocket expenses, aligning with SDG 1.

5A Adherence Framework

MaCare excels in the 5A framework:

- **Affordability** is ensured through subsidized CT scans (Rs. 3,000 in Thrissur) and dental implants (Rs. 20,000 in Kaloor)
- Accessibility is enhanced by strategic locations and transport connectivity
- Accommodation includes geriatric mobile units and extended hours
- Acceptability is reflected in high patient trust (95% satisfaction with doctors)
- **Availability** is supported by daily access to advanced equipment, serving 1,29,558 patients with minimal downtime.

Recommendations

- **Expand Telemedicine**: Develop a platform for video consultations and NCD monitoring, integrating wearables and urban specialist connections.
- Mobile Diagnostic Units in Kaloor: Deploy units with ultrasound and ECG for low-income urban areas
- **Preventive Health Programs**: Launch campaigns for diabetes, hypertension, and cancer screenings, partnering with NGOs for lifestyle workshops.
- **Dental Outreach in Thrissur**: Introduce a mobile dental unit with OPG and conduct oral health awareness camps.
- **Data Analytics**: Use test outcome data to prioritize high-impact NCD screenings for operational efficiency.

Conclusion

The MaCare Polyclinics in Thrissur and Kochi, supported by MAFIL, have emerged as vital healthcare hubs, delivering high-quality, affordable, and accessible medical and dental services to underserved communities in Kerala. By leveraging advanced diagnostic technologies, expanding super-specialty care, and prioritizing infrastructure development in healthcare, these centers have significantly reduced healthcare disparities, improved health outcomes, and built trust among over 1,29,558 patients. MAFIL's substantial financial and infrastructural support has been instrumental in sustaining this impact, aligning with the mission of "Precious Life, Priceless Care" and setting a model for equitable healthcare delivery.

Manappuram Gym

Introduction

Manappuram Premium Gym and Fitness Center, launched in September 2023 in Valappad, Thrissur, Kerala, is a pioneering fitness facility addressing the health and wellness needs of rural coastal communities. With limited premium fitness infrastructure in the region, the gym offers state-of-the-art equipment and diverse programs like Pilates, Zumba, HIIT, functional training, and specialized sports coaching. It aims to tackle public health challenges, particularly rising drug use among youth, by providing a structured environment for physical activity, mental well-being, and community engagement, establishing itself as a vital resource for Valappad.

Support provided

MAFIL provides essential financial and operational support, enabling the gym to maintain high-quality infrastructure and affordable membership rates (Rs. 2,000–5,000/month) for diverse socioeconomic groups. For 2023–2024, MAFIL's CSR contribution of Rs. 40,410,763 covered Rs. 40,007,354 for capital expenditure (equipment and maintenance) and Rs. 403,408 for operational costs (staffing, utilities, program delivery). This support offsets the gym's expenses of Rs. 46,871,733 against its revenue of Rs. 6,460,970, ensuring accessibility and sustainability in a rural context.

Highlights

- The gym has enrolled over 311 active members since its inception, with consistent monthly admissions (38–48 members)
- Operates from 5:30 AM to 10:00 PM, including women-only hours (11:00 AM–1:00 PM) for inclusivity.
- It features advanced equipment like imported cardio machines, strength training tools, and functional gear
- 10 athletes trained for regional competitions and strong community participation through Zumba and fitness workshops.

Overall performance

- Surveys indicate high satisfaction, with 86% rating equipment quality as excellent, 77% praising location convenience, and 81% willing to recommend the gym.
- Retention is strong, with 55% of members using the gym for over six months, though 18% find membership costs high, and 14% are unsatisfied, citing issues like parking.
- The gym's women-friendly environment (78% rate comfort and safety as excellent) and diverse
 programs, including Zumba and kids' camps, drive engagement across age groups, positioning it
 as a leading rural fitness facility.

Overall Impact

- Physical Health: Reduces risk of lifestyle diseases like diabetes (10% prevalence in Kerala), with 70% of members reporting improved strength and endurance within six months.
- Mental Well-being: Zumba and yoga classes alleviate stress and anxiety, enhancing psychological resilience in a region with rising substance abuse.
- **Youth Engagement**: Engages over 200 students annually, with 80% reporting increased discipline and self-esteem, diverting them from drug-related activities.
- **Community Cohesion**: Group classes and fitness events build social connections, reducing isolation and vulnerability to negative influences.

• Anti-Drug Efforts: Promotes fitness as a positive lifestyle, countering drug trafficking risks in coastal Kerala and encouraging healthy habits.

5A Adherence Framework

- Affordability is ensured through competitive fees and MAFIL's support
- Accessibility is enhanced by its Valappad location and extended hours
- Accommodation includes women-only hours, kids' and seniors' programs, and disability-friendly features
- Acceptability is reflected in 90%-member recommendation rates and community-focused events
- **Availability** is supported by daily operations and online booking, making it a convenient and inclusive facility compared to local gyms with limited services.

Recommendations

- Partner with schools for free fitness workshops targeting at-risk youth to promote physical activity.
- Introduce low-cost youth memberships (Rs. 500–1,000/month) to enhance access for low-income students.
- Launch anti-drug campaigns integrating fitness and awareness with local authorities.
- Expand sports coaching with scholarships for underprivileged athletes to compete at higher levels.
- Add mindfulness sessions like meditation to address psychological factors linked to drug use.
- Promote online fitness challenges to engage youth during off-hours via digital platforms.

Conclusion:

Manappuram Premium Gym and Fitness Center in Valappad is a transformative initiative for rural Thrissur, addressing the pressing need for health and wellness in a region grappling with rising drug use. With world-class facilities, affordable pricing, and inclusive programs, the gym empowers students, women, seniors, and the broader community to lead healthier, more disciplined lives. By investing in outreach, localized programs, and enhanced accessibility, the gym can further strengthen its role as a cornerstone of health, resilience, and community engagement in coastal Kerala, creating a lasting impact on the region's social and health landscape.

Manappuram Yoga

Introduction

Manappuram Yoga Centers, established by MAFIL in Valappad and Thrissur, Kerala, are dedicated to promoting holistic well-being through authentic yoga practices. Offering a range of programs including traditional yoga, geriatric yoga, ladies' batches, personal coaching, and Yoga Teacher Training Courses (TTC) certified by Yoga Alliance International, the centers cater to diverse groups such as women, seniors, children, and rural communities. With both online and offline classes, free yoga camps, and innovative offerings like aerial yoga and Ayurveda integration, the centers aim to enhance physical and mental health while making wellness accessible to all.

Support provided

In the fiscal year 2023-24, MAFIL provided substantial financial support to Manappuram Yoga Centers, allocating Rs.23,117 for capital expenditure on infrastructure such as high-quality mats and props, and Rs.5,814,606 for operational costs, including instructor salaries, utilities, maintenance, and online class platforms like Google Meet and Zoom. Total CSR support amounted to Rs.5,837,723, covering the gap between the centers' revenue of Rs.2,762,900 and total expenses of Rs.8,600,623, ensuring the sustainability and accessibility of their programs.

Highlights

The centers served 775 participants, with 494 in Thrissur and 281 in Valappad

- Diverse offerings like regular classes (515 participants), specialized courses (212 participants, including couples, geriatric, ladies' batches, personal coaching, and aerial yoga), and TTC programs training 58 teachers.
- Free yoga camps reached over 1,000 rural beneficiaries, while online classes engaged 300 participants, including diaspora communities.
- Survey findings from 28 beneficiaries showed high satisfaction, with 93% rating the centers
 excellent compared to other yoga facilities, 96% praising instructor professionalism, and 100%
 appreciating personalized coaching.

Overall performance

- The centers' infrastructure, particularly cleanliness (93% excellent) and safety (86% excellent), received positive feedback, though mats, props, and restrooms need improvement.
- Affordability was rated excellent by 54%, but 46% found fees fair, indicating room for cost
 adjustments. The centers' inclusive programs, professional instruction, and rural outreach
 through free camps have established them as a preferred wellness destination.
- High participant satisfaction (63% highly satisfied, 37% satisfied) and effectively addressing health and wellness needs in Thrissur.

Overall Impact

- **Health and Wellness**: Engaged 775 participants and over 1,000 rural beneficiaries, promoting physical fitness and mental resilience to combat chronic illnesses (28% prevalence) and stress-related disorders (15% prevalence).
- **Women's Empowerment**: Ladies' batches (154 participants) created safe spaces, enhancing women's health, confidence, and community bonding.
- **Economic Empowerment**: Trained 58 TTC graduates, with 70% becoming yoga instructors, boosting livelihoods, especially for women and rural residents.
- **Health Equity**: Free camps addressed healthcare gaps in rural areas, providing accessible preventive care.
- **Social Cohesion**: Inclusive programs like couples' and geriatric yoga strengthened community ties across diverse groups.

5A Framework

- Availability, offering diverse programs like regular classes, online sessions, and free camps for over 1,000 rural beneficiaries.
- Acceptability is high, with 93% rating the centers excellent and 63% highly satisfied.
- Accommodation is strong through tailored offerings like ladies' and geriatric classes
- Affordability (54% excellent, 46% fair)
- Acceptance is evident in strong community engagement and positive survey feedback.

Recommendations

- Introduce varied yoga styles like power yoga and meditation to meet 46% demand for diversity.
- Extend evening class timings to accommodate 33% requesting flexible schedules.
- Implement tiered pricing or subsidies to improve affordability for low-income participants.
- Enhance parking facilities in Thrissur to address 13% requesting improvements.
- Expand TTC programs to Valappad for greater rural economic empowerment.
- Increase frequency of free yoga camps to further tackle rural health disparities.

Conclusion

Manappuram Yoga Centers, backed by MAFIL's CSR support, have significantly advanced health, wellness, and social equity in Thrissur, serving over 790 participants and 1,000 rural beneficiaries through inclusive programs. High satisfaction, professional instruction, and rural outreach highlight their impact, while opportunities to enhance affordability, diversify offerings, and improve infrastructure can further strengthen their role. By implementing recommended strategies, the centers can continue to promote healthier, more empowered communities in Kerala and beyond.

Manappuram Ambulance

Introduction

The Manappuram Ambulance Project, backed by MAFIL, delivers critical emergency medical transport in Thrissur and Kochi, Kerala, addressing healthcare disparities in rural and semi-urban areas. Operating seven ambulances, including five NICU-PICU units, one ICCU unit, and one non-ICU unit, the initiative ensures timely access to life-saving care for marginalized communities, aligning with MAFIL's mission to improve public health.

Support provided

In 2023–24, MAFIL allocated Rs. 1.30 crores to the ambulance initiative, with Rs. 25.96 lakhs for capital expenditure and Rs. 1.04 crores for operational costs, covering staff salaries, fuel, and maintenance. This funding ensured the fleet's readiness, supported staff training, and enhanced emergency response capabilities, improving healthcare access for underserved populations.

Highlights

- The project served 2,323 patients, covering 1,09,503 kilometers, with each ambulance handling 5–6 daily calls.
- Rates of Rs. 55–75/km, significantly lower than private services (Rs. 100–150/km
- 50% BPL reimbursements ensured affordability.
- The fleet, equipped with advanced medical tools and staffed by BLS-certified professionals, achieved 10–15-minute response times, outperforming government and private services in rural areas.

Overall performance

- The ambulance service demonstrated high efficiency
- 44% BPL households among its 2,323 beneficiaries.
- With 90% of surveyed patients rating the service excellent
- 100% praising timely responses, the initiative bridged critical healthcare gaps.
- Strategic placement, 24/7 availability, and a dedicated hotline enhanced accessibility, while specialized units addressed pediatric and adult critical care needs effectively.

Overall Impact

- **Equitable Healthcare**: Served 44% BPL households, ensuring affordable access with lower rates and BPL discounts.
- Affordability: Rates of Rs. 55–75/km and transparent pricing reduced financial barriers for low-income families.
- **Timely Interventions**: 10–15-minute response times and BLS-certified staff enabled life-saving care during transit.
- **Mortality Prevention**: Specialized equipment and rapid transport reduced risks for NICU and ICCU patients.
- Rural Health System: Strengthened emergency infrastructure in semi-rural areas like Valapad and Mala.
- **Healthcare Connectivity**: Linked rural communities to advanced medical facilities, covering 1,09,503 km.

5A Framework

- Accessibility: Strategically stationed ambulances, 24/7 operations, and a dedicated hotline ensure prompt emergency access.
- Affordability: Subsidized rates (Rs. 55–75/km) and BPL reimbursements make services accessible to low-income families.
- **Availability**: Seven ambulances, including specialized units, handle 5–6 daily calls with advanced equipment.
- **Acceptability**: 90% excellent ratings reflect community trust, with culturally sensitive, professional staff
- **Accommodation**: Proximity to hospitals and tailored NICU-PICU/ICCU units meet diverse patient needs.

Recommendations

- **Public-Private Partnerships**: Collaborate with Kerala's health department or Ayushman Bharat for BPL reimbursements.
- Hospital Partnerships: Partner with hospitals to fund specialized services like neonatal care.

Conclusion

The Manappuram Ambulance Project has significantly enhanced emergency medical services in Thrissur and Kochi by providing timely, affordable, and specialized transport. With a focus on marginalized communities, it bridges healthcare gaps, builds trust, and serves as a model for community-centric healthcare interventions in Kerala.

Manappuram Aquatic Complex

Introduction

The Manappuram Aquatic Complex in Painoor, Valapad, Thrissur, Kerala, established by the Manappuram Foundation, is a vital initiative promoting health, safety, and inclusivity in a rural coastal community. Situated along Kerala's 590-km coastline, the complex features a 25-meter semi-Olympic pool, modern amenities like showers and changing rooms, and structured coaching for all ages, including women-only sessions led by certified coaches. It addresses critical regional needs such as drowning prevention, cultural barriers to women's participation, and limited access to modern aquatic facilities in rural areas.

Support provided

In the financial year 2023-24, the Manappuram Foundation (MAFIL) provided Rs. 24,03,224 to support the complex's operational expenditures, covering essential running costs. This funding was crucial for maintaining the facility's high standards, with expenses totaling Rs. 5,679,733 against a revenue of Rs. 3,276,509. MAFIL's contribution ensured the complex remained accessible and operational, supporting community-focused programs like subsidized panchayat coaching and women-only sessions.

Highlights

The complex addresses urgent regional challenges: it mitigates Kerala's high drowning rates (30,000 annually in India) by teaching water safety, overcomes cultural barriers through women-only sessions to boost female participation, and promotes health in a region with 15% obesity prevalence. Its modern infrastructure, rare in rural Thrissur, rivals urban facilities in Kochi or Chennai, offering affordable access (Rs. 1,000–2,000/month) compared to urban pools (Rs. 4,500–8,000). The diverse coaching team, including female instructors, enhances inclusivity, particularly for women and children.

Overall performance

- Regular packages attracted 209 users, while 14 received competitive training. Operating daily
 from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm, the facility accommodated diverse groups, with 1,548 general and 783
 student coaching sessions.
- In 2023-24, the complex served 3,683 users, with 2,331 opting for one-hour sessions, 599 children and 295 adults attending coaching camps, and 235 participating in panchayat-supported programs.
- Panchayat-based coaching reached 124 rural learners, and survey feedback highlighted 100% satisfaction with affordability and 90% with coaching quality, though 15% of users faced transport challenges.

Overall Impact

- Women's Empowerment: Women-only sessions led to a 60% increase in female participation, boosting confidence and overcoming cultural taboos.
- **Health Benefits**: 70% of regular swimmers reported better mood and reduced stress, while 50% of users over 40 noted improved joint mobility.

- **Youth Engagement**: Programs for 599 children provided positive outlets, reducing delinquency risks in coastal communities.
- **Competitive Training**: 14 local swimmers showed improved technique and discipline, inspiring broader community interest in swimming.

- **Eco-friendly operations**: Adopt solar-powered heating and water recycling to cut costs by 10–20%.

Conclusion

The Manappuram Aquatic Complex is a transformative hub in Valapad, delivering high-quality, affordable aquatic access that enhances safety, empowers women, and promotes health in a rural coastal setting. By addressing drowning risks, cultural barriers, and infrastructure gaps, it sets a replicable model for equitable community development, aligning with global sustainability goals and inspiring similar initiatives in other coastal regions.

Mahima Counselling Center

Introduction

Mahima Counselling Center, located in Valappad, Thrissur, serves a marginalized coastal community with limited access to resources, addressing psychological, developmental, and educational challenges. Catering to a diverse clientele, from children with speech delays to adults needing mental health or career support, the center is a vital resource in a region where socio-economic barriers restrict access to specialized care.

Support provided

MAFIL's support has significantly enhanced Mahima Center's capacity to serve Valappad's underserved population. By funding infrastructure expansion, hiring expert professionals, and enabling affordable, high-quality services, MAFIL's contribution of Rs. 3,938,805 in 2023-24 (Rs. 657,688 for capital expenses and Rs. 3,281,117 for operational expenses) bridged critical gaps in addressing psychological and developmental needs in a resource-scarce region.

Highlights

In 2023-24, Mahima Center reached 1,649 individuals, with a balanced gender distribution (720 females, 919 males) and a mix of 1,022 new and 627 follow-up cases. Services included audiology (e.g., Pure Tone Audiometry), speech therapy (e.g., 12-session packages), behavioral therapy, academic remedial training, and psychological counseling. The center's affordability (63% rated charges excellent), expert staff, and community trust (88% recommendation rate) highlight its effectiveness.

Overall performance

Mahima Center excels in delivering timely, affordable, and tailored services, with 75% of survey respondents rating appointment timeliness and payment flexibility as excellent, and 63% praising service quality and pricing transparency. Infrastructure and staff professionalism were well-regarded, though 13% noted areas like accessibility and follow-up as needing improvement, indicating minor gaps in an otherwise strong performance.

Overall Impact

- **Health Improvements**: Speech therapy enhanced communication, behavioral therapy improved social functioning, audiology restored hearing, and counseling alleviated anxiety and depression.
- **Inclusivity**: Balanced gender reach (720 females, 919 males) and diverse services ensured broad community engagement.
- **Accessibility**: Affordable services and local presence addressed barriers in a region with scarce specialized care.
- **Community Trust**: 88% recommendation rate and 75% excellent privacy ratings reflect strong community acceptance.
- **Sustainability**: MAFIL's support and alignment with UNSDGs (3, 4, 10, 17) strengthened long-term impact.

5A Framework

- **Affordability**: 63% rated service charges and transparency excellent; 75% appreciated flexible payment options.
- Accessibility: 50% rated transport/parking excellent; 25% of clients were walk-ins, with camps extending reach.
- Availability: 38% rated service range excellent; 75% praised timely appointments and expert staff.

- Acceptance: 88% would recommend the center; 75% rated privacy/confidentiality excellent.
- Accommodation: 63% rated service customization excellent, with flexible options like online counseling.

Recommendations

- Enhance Timeliness: Implement online booking and add appointment slots.
- Increase Affordability: Introduce subsidized programs or sliding-scale fees.
- Upgrade Infrastructure: Improve cleanliness, safety, and transport accessibility.
- Strengthen Follow-up: Enhance support through structured calls and staff training.
- Expand Programs: Develop more specialized behavioral and learning disability interventions.

Conclusion

Mahima Counselling Center has become an essential lifeline for Valappad's marginalized community, delivering impactful, affordable, and tailored services with MAFIL's support. By addressing diverse needs through audiology, speech therapy, behavioral interventions, and counseling, the center promotes well-being and reduces inequalities, aligning with UNSDGs. Continued improvements in accessibility, affordability, and specialized programs will further strengthen its role as a vital community resource.

Health projects - Rating

All the Health projects were assigned indicators that was in line with the 5As of Healthcare to evaluate access and effectiveness of healthcare services offered by MAFIL's CSR. The ratings were given based on the observations and interactions of the SAN team with the stakeholders of each project

Education

Mukundapuram Public School (MPS)

Overview: Mukundapuram Public School (MPS), located in Nadavaramba, Irinjalakuda, Thrissur, Kerala, is an ICSE-affiliated institution dedicated to providing high-quality education to rural students. Supported significantly by MAFIL, which contributed ₹2.405 crores (49% of total expenses) in 2023–24, MPS offers a modern, student-centric learning environment with advanced infrastructure, including smart classrooms, science and robotics labs, and sustainable initiatives like solar energy and rainwater harvesting. The school aims to bridge the urban-rural education gap, aligning with multiple UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), including Quality Education (SDG 4), Gender Equality (SDG 5), and Reduced Inequalities (SDG 10).

Key Achievements

- Enrollment and inclusivity: In 2023–24, MPS enrolled 716 students (48% female) from Pre-KG to Grade 12, with 95% from rural households and 60–65% as first-generation English-medium ICSE learners. Scholarships supported 26 students, enhancing access for low-income families.
- Academic and infrastructure excellence: The school delivers a rigorous ICSE curriculum, supported by 20+ smart classrooms, STEM labs, and digital tools like the MASH platform for streamlined academic management. All students passed their exams, and participation in Olympiads and inter-school events fosters holistic development.
- **Sustainability and community impact**: MPS employs 95% of its 80-strong workforce locally, boosting rural economies. Eco-friendly initiatives, including 126 solar panels and rainwater harvesting, reduce environmental impact.
- **Student and parental engagement**: Regular PTA meetings and community outreach, such as a fashion show for young students, enhance parental involvement and awareness, though community buy-in remains limited due to misconceptions about the school's name.

Challenges:

- **Retention issues**: Enrollment drops significantly after Grade 8, with no students in Grade 11 and only 10 in Grade 12, driven by parental concerns about the ICSE curriculum's rigor in higher grades.
- **English proficiency**: Students and teachers struggle with communicative English, hindered by a pronounced Malayalam accent and limited high-quality instruction.
- **Underutilized resources**: Science labs are used by only 14% of students, and sports activities lack engagement, as indicated by a survey of 25 students.
- Canteen and curriculum perception: Canteen food receives mixed feedback, and the ICSE curriculum is perceived as challenging, with 57% of students finding it "a little difficult" and 36% "very difficult."
- **Visibility and branding**: Limited awareness of MPS's offerings in nearby areas and misconceptions about its name (assumed to be a government school) hinder enrollment growth.

Survey Insights: A survey of 25 students (Classes 6–10) revealed high satisfaction with teachers (all rated "good" or "excellent" by older students) and confidence in academic performance (80–86%). However, science labs are underutilized, sports activities are rated as "okay" by most, and English proficiency remains a concern, with only 64% feeling confident. Students' written responses show enthusiasm but lack clarity, grammar, and critical reflection, underscoring the need for improved communication skills.

Recommendations

- Academic and extracurricular: Introduce structured training for inter-school competitions, a language club for English proficiency, and expanded after-school programs. Organize an inter-ICSE swimming competition and enhance sports variety.
- **Infrastructure**: Increase science lab integration into lessons and explore hostel facilities for outstation students.
- **Operational and financial sustainability**: Revisit fee structures, introduce tiered financial aid, and transition operational costs to school revenue through fundraising.
- **Community engagement and branding**: Strengthen PTA engagement, rebrand to clarify the school's ICSE identity, and boost rural outreach to increase admissions.
- **Retention strategies**: Offer targeted career guidance, remedial coaching, and integration with Ma Geet school for students transitioning to other boards.

Conclusion:

MPS has made significant strides in delivering quality ICSE education to rural Thrissur, supported by MAFIL's CSR initiatives. However, addressing retention challenges, enhancing English proficiency, improving resource utilization, and increasing community awareness are critical for long-term sustainability and impact. By implementing the recommended strategies, MPS can solidify its position as a leading rural education hub, empowering students to compete globally while fostering sustainable community development.

Manappuram Geetha Ravy School (Ma Geet)

Overview: Manappuram Geetha Ravy School (Ma Geet), located in Valappad, Thrissur, Kerala, is a CBSE-affiliated institution blending Montessori methods (Pre-KG to Class 2) with the CBSE curriculum (Class 3 onward). Supported by ₹1.6 crores from MAFIL in 2023–24 (39% of total expenditure), Ma Geet provides a modern, inclusive learning environment with smart classrooms, STEM labs, and sustainable infrastructure like solar power and rainwater harvesting.

Key achievements

- Enrollment and inclusivity: In 2023–24, Ma Geet enrolled 661 students (46% girls) from Pre-KG to Grade 10, with 276 new admissions, particularly strong in the KG section (165 students). Scholarships for 30 students and a 50% fee concession for staff children enhance affordability.
- Academic excellence: The school achieved a 100% pass rate in 2023–24, reflecting robust teaching methodologies and a supportive learning environment.
- Retention improvement: Only 56 transfer certificates were issued in 2023–24, down from 126 the previous year, indicating stronger student retention.
- Infrastructure and innovation: A new eco-friendly campus with 40 classrooms, smart boards, robotics/AI labs, a swimming pool, and a capacity for 1,500 students supports holistic education. The MASH platform streamlines academic management.
- Holistic development: Programs in robotics, coding, swimming, horse-riding, and school cinema
 foster critical thinking, creativity, and values. Support for students with learning disabilities
 through special educators and individualized education plans (IEPs) promotes inclusivity.
- Community impact: Employing 141 staff (95% local) boosts the rural economy, while facilities like a creche and infirmary support working parents.

Challenges

- English proficiency: Both students and teachers struggle with English fluency, pronunciation, and grammar, limiting effective communication. Current initiatives, like hiring a communicative English coach, show slow progress.
- Learning disability support: While Ma Geet offers remedial education, the lack of formal assessments for students with specific learning disabilities (SLDs) hinders tailored support.
- Secondary enrollment: Admissions in Grades 9–10 remain low (one student each), suggesting challenges in sustaining interest in higher grades.
- Teacher training: Teachers report feeling underprepared for smart classroom tools and English communication, despite regular workshops.
- Community awareness: Limited awareness of Ma Geet's offerings and CBSE accreditation in rural areas impacts enrollment growth.

Survey findings:

- High satisfaction with facilities (especially CCTV), smartboards, and the Montessori method, rated "excellent" by most.
- Computer labs, support classes, and English programs significantly boost confidence, with nearly all students reporting improved communicative skills.
- Strong teacher and peer support create a nurturing environment, though some students noted minor issues like bullying and challenging academics.

 Ma Geet is perceived as superior to other CBSE schools, with students valuing its facilities and teaching quality.

5A framework highlights

- Accessibility: The eco-friendly campus, transport services, and digital tools like MASH ensure access for rural students, including those with SLDs.
- Affordability: Competitive fees (₹49,000–₹52,600) and scholarships make quality education accessible, supported by MAFIL's CSR funding.
- Accommodation: Montessori methods, SLD support, and tailored digital content cater to diverse learning needs.
- Availability: Capacity for 1,500 students, 141 staff, and advanced facilities ensure resource availability.
- Acceptance: High retention, gender parity (46% girls), and parental trust reflect growing community acceptance.

Recommendations

- English proficiency: Implement comprehensive English training for teachers and students, including weekly conversational classes, language labs, and non-Malayalam-speaking educators.
- SLD support: Conduct formal SLD assessments and train teachers in inclusive practices to enhance IEPs.
- Teacher training: Provide hands-on training in smart classroom technology and NCERT methods, alongside addressing teacher pay and work environment concerns.
- Enrollment growth: Expand scholarships and launch targeted outreach to boost secondary-grade admissions and community awareness.
- STEM and extracurriculars: Invest in advanced STEM resources and coaching for national competitions. Enhance the school cinema program with global citizenship themes.
- Girls' empowerment: Introduce leadership workshops and a girls' club to foster confidence and ambition.

Conclusion

Ma Geet has emerged as a model for rural CBSE education, leveraging MAFIL's support to build advanced infrastructure and inclusive programs. However, addressing English proficiency, SLD support, and secondary enrollment challenges is critical for sustained impact. By implementing targeted interventions, Ma Geet can solidify its role as a transformative educational hub, empowering rural students for global success while encouraging community development.

MAIAM

Overview: The Manappuram Institute of Automotive Skills (MAIAM), located in Painoor, Edathiruthy, Thrissur, Kerala, provides industry-relevant automotive training to youth, particularly from rural and semi-urban areas. MAIAM offers a comprehensive Automotive Body Repair Technician — Level 4 program, certified by the Automotive Skill Development Council (ASDC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), and National Council for Vocational Education and Training (NCVET). By blending theoretical knowledge with hands-on practical training, MAIAM equips students with skills to excel in the automotive industry, supporting employability and economic empowerment in underserved communities.

Key achievements

- MAIAM successfully trained 56 new students in the Automotive Body Repair Technician course. Academic excellence: The school achieved a 100% pass rate in 2023–24, reflecting robust teaching methodologies and a supportive learning environment.
- The program achieved an impressive completion rate of 84%, with 47 out of 56 students successfully finishing the course.
- Infrastructure and innovation: A new eco-friendly campus with 40 classrooms, smart boards, robotics/AI labs, a swimming pool, and a capacity for 1,500 students supports holistic education. The MASH platform streamlines academic management.
- Of the 47 graduates, 45 actively sought employment, and 91% of them—41 students—secured jobs within three months of completing the course.
- All graduates who attempted the ASDC certification exams achieved a 100% pass rate, highlighting the high-quality training.

Challenges

- English proficiency: Both students and teachers struggle with English fluency, pronunciation, and grammar, limiting effective communication. Current initiatives, like hiring a communicative English coach, show slow progress.

- 75% rated the quality of partner organizations and trainer/mentor guidance as excellent
- 75% rated training space availability as excellent; 100% rated equipment and tools as excellent

- Accessibility: The MAIAM campus, located at Manappuram Agro-Farms, is accessible via reliable transport services, benefiting students from surrounding rural areas.
- Affordability: MAIAM's fee range of Rs. 55,000–Rs. 60,000 is competitive compared to urban institutes charging Rs. 1 lakh or more for similar programs.
- Accommodation: The hostel accommodates students, with separate facilities for male and female trainees, ensuring a safe and supportive environment.
- Availability: MAIAM has the capacity to train 200 students annually, with plans to expand to accommodate growing demand. Four batches in 2023–24 reflect consistent enrollment and availability of training slots.
- Acceptance: High placement rates (85%) and low dropout rates (8 students) indicate strong acceptance among students and families.

Recommendations

- Enhance trainer capacity: Conduct regular professional development sessions for trainers to ensure relevant and engaging instruction.
- Expand soft skills and English fluency training: Introduce year-round workshops on soft skills alongside English fluency training to improve employability in customer-facing roles.
- Strengthen community and industry partnerships: Forge partnerships with additional local dealerships, automotive firms to expand internship, job placement opportunities.
- Develop advanced in-house training programs: Establish in-house programs for advanced skills.
- Promote gender inclusion: Launch awareness campaigns to encourage female enrollment enrollment.
- Build robust alumni networks: Strengthen alumni engagement through active WhatsApp groups for peer learning and knowledge sharing.
- Boost social media presence: Enhance social media outreach on platforms like Instagram and LinkedIn to complement word-of-mouth promotion and attract a broader audience.
- Review course duration: Evaluate the current course duration based on student feedback and industry requirements, extending it if necessary to ensure comprehensive skill development.

Conclusion: MAIAM has emerged as a leading vocational training institute in rural Thrissur, thanks to MAFIL's substantial support, which has bolstered infrastructure and training quality. The institute's ASDC-certified program, industry partnerships, and affordable fees have made automotive skills accessible to underserved communities, driving employability and economic empowerment.

Ma Campus

Overview: MA Campus, formerly known as MAPE, was established in 2018 and rebranded as MA Campus to provide professional coaching for Chartered Accountancy (CA), Cost and Management Accountancy (CMA), and Company Secretary (CS) courses. With campuses in Thrissur and Valappad, MA Campus aims to deliver accessible, affordable, and high-quality professional education to students in Kerala, particularly targeting underprivileged and rural communities.

Highlights

- Total Enrollment: 256 students across both campuses, with Thrissur (194) having over three times the enrollment of Valappad (62).
- Popular Courses: CA Inter (2 groups, New) has the highest enrollment (77), followed by CMA Foundation (New) (66) and CMA Inter (1 group) (39).
- Valappad: Focuses on CA Inter and CMA Inter (1 group), with no students in CA Final or CMA Foundation.

Survey findings

- First in household pursuing coaching: A significant 67% of students reported being the first in their household to pursue entrance exam preparation or coaching.
- Coaching and course structure: The effectiveness of training sessions and subject expertise of teachers both scored 36% excellent.
- Affordability: Affordability was a strong point with 80% rating course fees as reasonable.
- Infrastructure provided: Infrastructure was highly rated, with 90% finding facilities excellent.
- Location of Ma Campus: The location was well-received, with 80% rating campus convenience as excellent and 70% finding class timings suitable.
- Internship and article ship support: Guidance for job placement post-course was rated excellent by 60%.
- Comparison with other institutes: 33% rated their experience at Ma Campus as better than other institutes.

Adherence to 5A framework— Ma Campus

- Affordability: Offers courses at 8,000–53,000 annually, lower than competitors' 15,000–60,000, enabling access for underprivileged students. Provides scholarships from 25% to full coverage, supporting 24% of students from below poverty line (BPL) backgrounds.
- Accessibility: Located in rural and semi-urban Valappad and Thrissur, bringing professional CA, CMA, and CS coaching to underserved areas.
- Accommodation: Provides well-equipped facilities, including spacious classrooms, libraries, and air-conditioned study rooms for extended practice. Lacks hostel facilities, limiting support for students from distant districts, as noted in audit recommendations.
- Acceptance: Enjoys a strong reputation, with 75% of surveyed students rating it excellent or very good.
- Availability: Operates two centers in Thrissur and Valappad, offering CA, CMA, CS, and ACCA courses with adequate faculty (one teacher per 30 students). Provides comprehensive resources,

including digital platforms, mock tests, and study materials aligned with ICAI, ICMAI, and ICSI curricula.

Recommendations

- Enhance marketing efforts to build a stronger reputation and increase visibility among prospective students.
- Provide additional support for first-generation coaching students, such as mentorship programs, to ease their transition.
- Revise the course structure to improve clarity of subject delivery, organize content more effectively, and adjust study break lengths for better balance.
- Continue investing in infrastructure, ensuring consistent availability of study materials and teaching aids.
- Improve access to the campus by enhancing transportation options or providing shuttle services.
- Strengthen internship and article ship support by partnering with relevant organizations and offering more tailored guidance.
- Leverage alumni pride through events, recognition programs, and networking opportunities.
- Improve overall student satisfaction by addressing feedback on course structure and internship support to increase recommendations.

Conclusion: MA Campus has made significant strides in providing affordable, high-quality professional coaching for CA, CMA, and CS courses in rural and semi-urban Kerala, supported by MAFIL's substantial financial backing, With modern infrastructure, experienced faculty, and a focus on inclusivity—evidenced by 48% female enrollment and 63% first-generation learners—the institute empowers underprivileged students to pursue competitive careers in finance and accounting, achieving a 90% job placement rate. The program must be continued to ensure that rural youth benefit from the same.

Ma Academy

Overview: Ma Academy, with centers in Triprayar and Palakkad, is dedicated to delivering high-quality entrance coaching for competitive exams such as NEET, KEAM (KEEM), and JEE, alongside tuition for CBSE and State Board students in Classes 10, 11, and 12. Located near Triprayar bus stand and in Palakkad, Ma Academy empowers rural students by providing accessible, affordable, and specialized education to bridge the urban-rural educational divide.

Highlights:

- Enrollment: In 2023-24, Ma Academy enrolled 374 students in Triprayar and 105 in Palakkad across various programs, reflecting growing demand,
- Academic Performance: Triprayar's 100% clearance rate in CRASH NEET and CRASH KEEM reflects
 effective short-term coaching. Both centers achieved 100% pass rates in Class 11 and 12 board
 exams
- Student Retention: Retention rates were strong, with 23 dropping out from Triprayar and 12 from Palakkad.
- In 2023-24, 310 students received scholarships, with 104 availing full waivers under the SC/ST + BPL category from Triprayar and 46 from Triprayar.

Survey findings

- The survey shows that Ma Academy enjoys a strong reputation among its students.
- 71% of students reported being the first in their household to pursue entrance exam preparation or coaching, highlighting the academy's role in opportunities to first-generation learners.
- **Teaching and support quality**: Doubt-clearing support scored the highest, with 94% rating it excellent, showing strong student satisfaction in this area.
- The duration of the course (71% excellent) and session length (81% excellent) were generally satisfactory, with minor concerns about course duration (29% average).
- The affordability of Ma Academy's course was rated highly by students. Value for money stood out, with 93% rating it
- Learning tools and technology received a slightly lower 76% excellent rating.

Adherence to 5A framework– Ma Academy

Affordability: Ma academy excels in affordability, with 93% of students rating value for money as excellent and 88% praising overall affordability fee and scholarships. The academy's scholarship programs, such as 100% waivers for SC/ST + BPL students with 85% marks, ensure financial barriers do not hinder access to quality education.

Acceptance: The academy enjoys strong acceptance among students, with 65% viewing it as highly respected and 71% definitely recommending it to others.

Availability: Ma academy ensures availability through its comprehensive course offerings, including repeater batches, crash courses, and classes 10 to 12, catering to diverse student needs.

Accommodation: The academy's infrastructure, rated excellent by 94% for classroom environment, seating, and cleanliness, provides a highly accommodating learning environment.

Accessibility: Accessibility is a key strength, with 94% of students rating the convenience of location and ease of transportation as excellent. Class timings (81% excellent) and the availability of online/offline options (82% excellent) ensure that students can access education conveniently.

Recommendations

- Improve performance: Strengthen NEET and KEEM/JEE coaching in Palakkad by recruiting experienced faculty, increasing mock tests, and analyzing student performance data to address gaps.
- Introduce SLD Support: Develop a framework for identifying and supporting students with specific learning disabilities (SLDs) through trained educators and individualized plans, aligning with inclusive education goals.
- Strengthen community engagement: Conduct outreach programs to educate parents about competitive exams and career paths, increasing enrollment and trust in rural areas.
- Sustain scholarship programs: Continue and expand scholarship offerings, particularly for BPL and SC/ST students, to ensure equitable access despite reduced rates from 2025.
- Enhance exam preparation guidance and course content organization by incorporating more structured study plans and practice tests to better prepare students for entrance exams.
- Improve counselling sessions by offering more personal support and increasing the frequency of sessions to address student concerns effectively.
- Upgrade learning tools and technology to ensure students have access to modern, efficient resources for their studies.
- Increase flexibility in online/offline learning options to accommodate diverse student preferences and improve accessibility.
- Strengthen efforts to raise the academy's visibility to further establish it as a highly respected institution.

Conclusion

Ma Academy has made significant strides in providing quality entrance coaching and tuition to rural students, largely due to MAFIL's support of Rs. 1.49 crores in 2023-24, which enhanced infrastructure and sustained operations. The new buildings in Triprayar and Palakkad, equipped with smart classrooms and labs, have elevated the academy's ability to deliver competitive exam preparation on par with urban centers. However, challenges such as English proficiency, limited SLD support, and Palakkad's low NEET/KEEM clearances require urgent attention. By enhancing teacher training, introducing inclusive education measures, and strengthening digital and community engagement, Ma Academy can further its mission of bridging the urban-rural educational divide. With continued MAFIL backing, Ma Academy is well-positioned to become a transformative force in rural education, aligning with NEP 2020 and UNSDG goals for equitable, quality education.

MISD

Introduction: The Manappuram Institute of Skill Development (MISD) in Valappad, Thrissur, delivered two key programs in 2023-24: the Healthcare Assistant Certification Program (GHA) and the Certified Beauty Assistant Program. These programs aim to equip rural students with practical skills for careers in healthcare and beauty therapy. In 2023-24, MISD had a total expense for Rs. 34.26 lakhs. Of this, MAFIL provided Rs 22.2 lakhs as CSR support. This included Rs 21.65 lakhs for salaries (64.8%). Another Rs. 56,123 was spent towards quality infrastructure, enabling affordable education for rural students.

Key highlights

- In 2023-24 academic year, MISD trained a total of 117 rural students, with 96 enrolled in the GHA course and 21 in the CBA course
- 73% of students were first-generation learners, ensuring access for marginalized groups from low-income rural backgrounds.
- 80% of employed graduates secured promotions or higher-paying roles within a year.
- 90% of students reported improved communication, time management, and problem-solving skills.
- GHA graduates supported 1,200+ patients monthly across 15 hospitals, reducing patient wait times by 20% and improving infection control practices.
- Students reported increased respect from family and community.

Survey findings

- The primary driving force behind enrollment was a deep-rooted passion for healthcare, with 90%
 of students inspired by the growing demand for skilled medical assistants in hospitals and home
 care settings.
- The course's visibility was significantly boosted by MISD's robust digital presence, with 80% of students discovering it through social media platforms, showcasing the institution's effective online marketing strategies.
- MISD's stellar reputation, rated as excellent by 90% of respondents, is anchored in its NSDC accreditation and strategic partnerships with hospitals, which enhance its credibility and appeal.
- The course's affordability was a standout feature, with 100% of respondents noting that the fees
 were accessible, enabling participation from low-income students and broadening educational
 access.
- Beyond technical expertise, 90% of students reported significant improvements in soft skills like communication and empathy, enabling them to handle over 30 patient queries daily with professionalism and care.

Adherence to 5A framework- MISD

- **Affordability:** Course fees were kept minimal: Rs. 18,500 for GHA and Rs. 15,000 for Beauty Assistant in 2023–24, allowing low-income rural youth to participate.
- Accessibility: Programs were offered in Valappad, Thrissur a rural region directly serving communities with limited access to vocational education.
- Accommodation: Courses are designed to suit the needs of rural learners: short duration (3–4 months) and offline, in-person sessions to ensure engagement.
- Acceptance: Accredited by the National Skill Development Council (NSDC), enhancing the
 credibility and national acceptance of the certifications. Strong placement tie-ups with 15
 hospitals and 10 salons ensured industry recognition and job relevance.
- Availability: Two key job-oriented programs (GHA and Beauty Assistant) offered annually, consistently expanding to meet demand (135 enrollments in 2024–25).

Recommendations

- Increase admissions: Use targeted marketing and scholarships to boost enrollment, reducing reliance on MAFIL funding.
- **Enhance soft skills training**: Add modules on communication and empathy to better prepare students for workplace interactions.
- **Conduct community impact assessments**: Gather stakeholder feedback to evaluate broader impacts.
- **Improve data management**: Implement systems to track key performance indicators for continuous improvement.

Conclusion

The MISD's GHA and Certified Beauty Assistant programs empowered 117 rural students in 2023-24, achieving a 96% employment rate, female participation, and support for 1,200+ patients monthly. By promoting social inclusion, community participation, and sustainable livelihoods, the programs enhance community health and economic stability. To ensure sustainability, MISD should increase admissions, strengthen soft skills training, and improve data management, solidifying its role as a leading skill development provider in Valappad.

DDU-GKY

Introduction: The Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana (DDU-GKY) is a Government of India initiative focused on transforming rural youth into an economically independent and globally relevant workforce. As part of this initiative, Manappuram Foundation operates MISD centers in Malappuram and Coimbatore. These centers offer structured skill development programs with a strong emphasis on industry-aligned training and placement support, targeting unemployed rural youth between the ages of 15 and 35.

Key Highlights:

- About the center: Co-funded by the Central Government (60%) and State Government (40%), the program targets underprivileged youth, equipping them with skills for sustainable employment.
- In 2023–24, the center trained 177 youth (151 in Accounts Executive across 6 batches; 26 in Fitness Trainer across 1 batch), a 15% increase from 154 trainees in 2022–23.
- Of the total enrollments, 74 were women (42%), reflecting strong gender inclusivity aligned with Kerala's progressive trends.
- The center achieved a 78% placement rate, with 138 trainees securing jobs.
- Only 12 trainees dropped out before completing training in 2023–24, compared to 25 in 2022–23, indicating strong retention (93% completion rate).

Survey findings

- **Experience with the institute**: The survey shows that 62% of beneficiaries rated their overall experience as excellent.
- **Coaching and support:** 91% of the respondents were satisfied with the quality of trainers, and 87% were happy with both course content and soft skill training.
- Infrastructure: The infrastructure provided by MAFIL was rated highly, with 91% of beneficiaries satisfied with accommodation, 93% with safety and hygiene, and 91% with classroom and training equipment.
- **Job placement support**: A significant 94% of respondents confirmed receiving job placement support from MAFIL. This high percentage reflects the program's strong focus on helping beneficiaries secure employment, making it a key strength of the initiative.
- **Employment outcomes**: The survey found that 2% of beneficiaries secured jobs related to their course, 80% were satisfied with their salaries, and 91% could apply course skills in their jobs.
- Supporting first-gen learners: 83% of respondents were first-generation learners in their families.

Alignment with the 5A Framework- DDU-GKY

- Accessibility: The DDUGKY Center ensures broad access to skill development for underprivileged rural youth. Free residential training removes geographic and logistical barriers. 42% female participation aligns with Kerala's gender inclusivity trends.
- **Affordability:** The program eliminates financial barriers, making training accessible to economically disadvantaged youth. All costs, including course fees, food, accommodation, and insurance, are fully subsidized.

- **Availability:** The curriculum is tailored to meet industry demands, ensuring relevant and job-ready skills.
- **Acceptance:** The program builds trust through credible outcomes and industry recognition. 78% placement rate, with verified job retention for at least three months, demonstrates reliability.
- Accommodation: The center is designed to evolve with changing needs and scale its impact.
 Modern infrastructure, including digital learning resources and smart classrooms, supports flexible training delivery. Build industry linkages, placing trainees in competitive job markets, aligning with global partnership goals

Recommendations

- Strengthen community ties: Conduct awareness drives with local leaders.
- Empower women trainees: Launch mentorship and leadership programs for women.
- Improve food quality or variety to address the relatively lower satisfaction with this aspect of infrastructure.
- Enhance support for the small group of beneficiaries who rated their overall experience as poor to identify and resolve their challenges.
- Strengthen salary negotiation training or job matching better align employment outcomes with beneficiaries' salary expectations.
- Continue focusing on job placement support to maintain its high success rate and ensure all beneficiaries receive assistance.
- Expand outreach to first-generation learners to sustain the program's impact on underserved communities.
- Maintain the affordability of the program to ensure it remains accessible to economically disadvantaged groups.

Conclusion

The Manappuram DDU-GKY center, bolstered by MAFIL's CSR support, has become a role model of rural skill development, training 177 youth and placing many in sustainable jobs in 2023–24. The center's infrastructure and inclusive approach position as a good example for rural empowerment. These infrastructure enhancements have contributed to creating a more conducive learning environment, enabling institutions to expand their reach and improve service delivery.

Education projects – Rating

30 indicators were assigned and a rating scale of 1 to 5 was used for each indicator with 5 being the highest score. The ratings were given based on the observations and interactions of the SAN team with the stakeholders of each project
